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
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Accommodation

We do not have halls of residence at Screen and Film School Birmingham, which means you must find housing privately, but we have various resources available to help with every step of the process.

Birmingham has a large amount of possibilities for accommodation such as flats, shared houses, and private halls. However, as Birmingham is a university city there is a heavy demand for student accommodation. We advise you to look as early as possible to find a place that suits your needs.

Alternatively, there are many letting agencies and private landlords/landladies based in Birmingham. If you are going through a letting agent you will be expected to pay a holding fee, agency fees, a deposit and usually one month's rent up front, plus provide a guarantor.

Ensure that the letting agent you use is following the code of practice of the National Association of Estate Agents.

RENT AND BILLS

Below are some guidelines for the average price of accommodation in Birmingham.

Accommodation Price per month

Student Halls £250 - 300 (inc. bills)

House/Flat Share £350 - 450 (not inc. bills,

2 or more)

As a full time student, you are not liable to pay council tax if you are house sharing with other students. The local Council Tax Office will be notified of students who are exempt after enrolment. However, you can also request a letter to confirm your student status from Screen and Film School Admissions.

Students are responsible for setting up and paying for their utility bills, including water, electric, gas and internet access.

FINDING HOUSEMATES

Facebook is a good way to link up with people who are already at Screen and Film School or who are starting at the same time as you. Some students set up groups prior to starting Screen and Film School in order to find housemates. Using this facility is a great way to post information about yourself, the type of housing you are looking for and any rooms that you or others may know of which are available for rent.

It's the perfect place for students to acquaint themselves with their fellow course friends and find appropriate housemates. Look for group names such as 'Screen and Film School'.

TIPS FOR VIEWING PROPERTIES

We recommend viewing a property at least twice. You'll be more likely to notice problems the second time around.

- Take someone with you or let someone else know exactly where you are when you visit a property, just to err on the side of caution.
- It's also a good idea to visit the area at night. If you do this, please ensure you stick to the point above and take someone with you.
- Make sure you and all your other housemates view the property. Don't take someone else's word that the property is right for you.
- Compare a range of different landlords/landladies and properties.
- Take your time and don't let landlords/landladies pressure you there is a surplus of good properties in the area and you will find somewhere you like.
- When you go to view, take notes and photos and use our checklist to make sure you don't miss anything.
- Get informed knowing your rights will help you view properties more critically and put you in a stronger negotiating position.

HOW DO I KNOW WHAT TO LOOK FOR WHEN VIEWING A PROPERTY?

We have checklists and tools to help when you're viewing properties. Use the checklist below to make sure you ask the right questions and look into all the key areas:

- Does the place look well maintained?
- Will you be warm enough in winter?
- Will it be safe and secure?
- Does it have the space and facilities you need (i.e washing machine, heating, fridge/freezer)?
- Are the current tenants happy with the landlord/landlady?
- Is the property affordable and good value?
- Is the area suitable for your needs?



Location

Where should I be looking?

Screen and Film School Birmingham is located in a central position.

There is an abundance of student accommodation within a fairly short distance of the building, and plenty of house and flat shares run by private landlords/landladies in other popular student areas.

Please take into consideration the cost of travelling and the time it takes to get to the Film School from where you choose to live.

The following areas in particular are a good place to look for shared student accommodation:

- Birmingham City Centre
- Selly Oak
- Moseley and Kingsheath
- Edgbaston

Birmingham is well connected via public transport services; frequent buses that run all through the night, rail and cycle lanes making it easy to get around.

Please note there are no parking facilities available at Screen and Film School Birmingham.





Transport

Screen and Film School Birmingham is well connected to the rest of the city via public transport.

TRAIN

Birmingham has eight local railways that cross the city and make moving between venues and attractions easy. New Street is the largest and busiest of the three main railway stations in the city centre of Birmingham. It is a central hub of the British railway system and makes travelling throughout the UK a breeze.

Having events in the surrounding cities and towns is now easier than ever with the Midland Metro which will whisk you between Birmingham and Wolverhampton. Network West Midlands provides online timetables, fares including day tickets and passes, ticket purchase and route planning. To visit the Centro website, use www.centro.org.uk

BUS AND METRO

There are buses to all suburbs and areas of Birmingham making Birmingham brilliant for easy, affordable travel. Night buses that go throughout the evening and early hours to places as far away as Coventry. Getting home from an event is safe, cheap and easy. Network West Midlands has all the timetables and fair information online for easy ticket buying and route planning. More and more local buses have facilities such as low floors for easy access for wheelchair users and pushchairs.

TAXI

Birmingham's well-regulated taxis are especially convenient for those with heavy luggage or returning from a night out. TOA taxis are Birmingham's black cab operators. They can be hailed in the street or reached at one of the many taxi ranks in the city centre; the main ones are at New Street Station, Stephenson Street and Digbeth Coach Station.

BIKE

With miles of canals and a compact city centre, what better way to explore Birmingham and the wider region than by bicycle? There are cycle lanes or paths on many of the major routes into and across the city that take in some of the city's beautiful parks and waterways.

Frequently Asked Questions

Most landlords/landladies/agents will ask you to sign a tenancy agreement. This is a legally binding document setting out each party's rights and responsibilities. By signing it, both you and the landlord/landlady have certain rights protected in law which can't be overwritten by the contract.

Before you sign, make sure you understand all the clauses, so there can be no nasty surprises after you've signed.

If asked to sign an agreement, it is likely to be an Assured Shorthold Tenancy Agreement and will normally last for at least six months, after which the tenancy will run on a monthly basis. However, many tenancies run for a fixed term, i.e. July 1st 2023 to June 30th 2024.

In this case make sure that you are happy with the length of the contract as it is very unlikely that you will be able to end the tenancy early.

The terms of the agreement must be in plain, intelligible language and not be unfair. For example, the tenant should not be restricted from breaking a fixed term agreement if the landlord/landlady is not in the same way, nor should they be subject to unreasonable rent increases or held to unreasonable penalty clauses (for example, extortionate charges for late payment of rent).

Get a tenancy agreement checked first by an informed person such as an advisor from the Citizens Advice Bureau. If the landlord/landlady/ agent won't let you take the contract away to get it checked first, think twice about signing it. Spend a little extra time in getting your contract checked out to save time, money and stress later in the year.

WHAT IS THE LANDLORD/LANDLADY RESPONSIBLE FOR?

- Heating and hot water installation
- Baths, sinks, basins and other sanitary installations
- The structure of the exterior of the property
- Repairs and safety of gas and electrical appliances
- Ensuring that any furniture that he or she supplies meets fire resistant requirements

WHAT IS THE TENANT RESPONSIBLE FOR?

- Water and sewage charges
- Utility bills gas, electricity, telephone and internet connection (if any)
- Taking care of the property
- Using the property in a responsible way
- · Paying the rent as agreed
- Keeping to the terms and conditions of the agreement

WHAT RIGHTS DO BOTH THE LANDLORD/LANDLADY AND TENANT HAVE?

The landlord/landlady or his agents have the right to access the property at reasonable times during the day to carry out repairs for which they are responsible for and inspect the condition of the property.

24 hours' written notice to inspect the property must be given. Arrangement for access to the property must be written into the contract.

Tenants have the right to possess and enjoy the property during the tenancy without any interruption from the landlord/landlady.

This clause does not limit any of the rights made under this agreement that the tenant has allowed the landlord/landlady to exercise. Neither does it prevent the landlord/landlady from taking lawful steps to enforce these rights if the tenant should break any of the terms of agreement.



WHAT BILLS CAN I EXPECT TO PAY?

Depending on your own personal use you can expect to pay £20 - £25 per week for utility bills.

Remember that if solely full time students occupy a property then they are exempt from Council Tax.

WHAT IS A DEPOSIT?

The deposit is generally the equivalent of one month's rent. Your landlord/landlady/agent must, under the 2004 Housing Act, protect your deposit within 14 days of receiving it as part of the Tenancy Deposit Protection Scheme and provide you with certain information relating to this.

This scheme ensures that deposits paid to the landlords/landladies are kept safe and that tenants get their deposits back at the end of the tenancy, so long as there hasn't been a breach of the tenancy agreement, such as unpaid rent. Remember that the money held as a deposit remains yours at all times and not the landlords/landladies, and only by mutual agreement should any money be deducted.

Your deposit, or part of it, will be withheld if you:

- Fail to return ALL keys at the end of the tenancy
- Are responsible for any damage to the property, either wilful or negligent
- Have not cleaned the property adequately
- Have left rubbish which needs removing from the property

CAN I DEDUCT MY DEPOSIT FROM MY LAST MONTH'S RENT?

No, because to do so would be a breach of your contract. It is important that rent and deposits are separate.

WHAT IS A GUARANTOR AND WILL I NEED TO SIGN A GUARANTOR FORM?

A guarantor is someone who signs an agreement to pay for any rent or damages if the tenant fails to pay up. The guarantor will most likely be a parent or guardian.

Some landlords/landladies ask for a guarantor but not all do. So there are still plenty of properties to choose from if you don't have someone who will be a guarantor for you, you'll just need to look around.

A guarantor is taking on quite a large responsibility, particularly if you are signing a joint contract. For example, if your housemate hasn't paid their rent, your guarantor could be made to pay.

Do not sign a contract that requires a guarantor form until you and your guarantors have read the form and agreed to sign. If you have already signed a contract but a guarantor refuses to sign, you might not get the keys to the property. A good landlord/landlady will give you copies of the forms and time to check them through.

Ask the landlord/landlady to accept a limited guarantee from your guarantor e.g. just covering your rent/damages.

Tell your guarantor not to give too much personal information on the form e.g. NI number, bank details or passport details should not be necessary.

I AM LEAVING THE HOUSE A FEW WEEKS EARLY - CAN I GET MY DEPOSIT BACK EARLY?

It may be possible for you to come to an arrangement for the early return of the deposit but the landlord/landlady/agent will obviously want to inspect the house and check all rent is paid.

WE CANNOT AFFORD TO PAY THE FINAL UTILITY BILLS; CAN WE LEAVE OUR DEPOSIT OR THE LANDLORD/LANDLADY/AGENT TO PAY FOR THEM?

No, not if the bills are in the name of the tenantsthe utility companies will chase the named persons and not the landlord/landlady/agent. Your deposit will be protected as part of the Tenancy Deposit Protection Scheme and therefore cannot be used by the landlord/landlady/agent.

This collaborative and productive spirit and drive is what makes Birmingham stand out, and with 12 universities and over 185,000 students on average, the under 25s make up around 40% of Birmingham's population, as the innovative and driven talent of tomorrow cluster to one of the UK's most up and coming cities in the industry.

An inclusive city, Birmingham Pride began in 2014 and has since awarded over £250k to deserving local community and support groups in the area, also cementing the district's place as a diverse and welcoming city featuring a wealth of culture,

BIRMINGHAM FILM FESTIVAL

Birmingham Film Festival is a platform for new films and emerging talent. Each year 200 films are screened over a ten day period, as well as industry Q&A sessions, workshops, seminars, and the chance to network.

FLATPACK FILM FESTIVAL

Every May bank holiday Flatpack appear at venues across Birmingham with the 'magnificently eclectic' Flatpack Festival. The annual festival is complemented by an itinerant year-round program including film-tents at music festivals and rural archive tours. Flatpack is a lead partner in Film Hub Midlands, part of the UK Film Audience Network aimed at developing a thriving film culture in the Midlands.

MILLENNIUM POINT

Home of the Birmingham Film Festival, Millennium Point is located in the city centre close to Moor Street and New Street train stations. The iconic venue hosts a wide range of events each year.

CUSTARD FACTORY

Former site of the Birds Custard Factory, the area has been dynamically regenerated to create Birmingham's buzzing creative and digital district. The hub of Birmingham's creative scene,

Custard Factory houses a plethora of boutique shops, restaurants, bars, cafes, and the delightful Mockingbird Bar and Theatre.

If dirty burgers aren't your scene and you're looking for something a bit more chić, one of Birmingham's most highly regarded chefs, Aktar Islam, delivers his delicious modern interpretation of Indian and Bangladeshi cuisine at the stylish and sophisticated venue **Opheem**, earning the esteemed restaurant a Michelin star in the process.

Gaigin Sushi on Bristol Street is renowned for its theatrical approach, and wows diners with their preparation, whilst the art deco style of **The Oyster Club** is sure to impress as Birmingham's finest seafood restaurant.

If Italian cuisine is more your style, then the family run **Laghi's Deli** on the fringes of the city centre brings an authentic taste of Northern Italy to Birmingham.

If good old classic pub food is more your thing, then it's hard to find better than **The Pint Shop** and their unique take on 'pub grub'. Whether it's their exhaustive list of beers or flair for a unique twist to their meals, they have something to suit everyone's palette in and around Birmingham.

Nightlife


It's hard to get much more diverse than Birmingham's vibrant and bustling nightlife, featuring some of the best bars, pubs, clubs and restaurants the UK has to offer, from popular chains to unique boutique establishments.

A rich and eclectic mix of live music, comedy and clubbing is available, whether it's a retro and soul night you fancy at **The Night Owl**, a 1940s style cinema evening at **The Electric Cinema**, hilarity at stand-up spot **The Glee Club**, indie vibes at **Snobs**, or a mad night out devastating the dance floor at top clubs such as **Lab11**, **The Tunnel Club**, **The Rainbow Venues**, **Hare and Hounds**, **the O2 Academy**, **The Mill**, or **Monastery**, an actual former Monastery now transformed into a 21st century Birmingham nightspot.

Birmingham is an inclusive city, and the LGBTQI+ community have their very own neighbourhood which is centered along Hurst Street, next to the Chinese Quarter in the city centre. Clubs such as **The Nightingale**, **Bolts** and **The Village Inn** are weekly hotspots, whilst **Club Kids Birmingham** run events hosted by legendary RuPaul's Drag Race stars such as Miz Cracker, Shea Coulee, Thorgy Thor and Bebe Zahara Benet.

That's not to mention Birmingham Pride, which is held every spring Bank Holiday weekend and attracts over 70,000 visitors each year and offers a variety of day and night time events for everyone to enjoy.

With such a huge student population, the city has become a hub for having a good time, and because everything is so close together it makes getting from place to place just a few minutes' walk, or you can travel around the city by taxi for less than £5.
